- Visit an [Important Bird Area](#) (IBA)
 - Learn about the unique flora and fauna in your local IBA by exploring it on foot and in some cases, by boat. Find a local IBA [here!](#) Keep track of the birds you see and submit your sightings through [eBird](#) Canada.
 - Here are a few ideas of activities you can do in most IBAs
 - Bird watching, Bicycling, Walking/running, Nature photography, Canoeing/kayaking, Picnicking

- Visit your Local Urban Greenspace
 - Explore your [NatureHood](#): Go to nearby parks, conservation sites, or public gardens.
 - Here are a few ideas of activities you can do in most greenspaces:
 - Bird watching, bicycling, walking/running, nature photography, playing a game, canoeing/kayaking, picnicking.

- Bird Crafts & Games
 - Bird stencils, bird colouring books, a how-to on using binoculars, and junior birders guidebooks that help identify the parts of a bird and provide activities for children.
 - Bird face painting, making bird masks, and bird bingo, can facilitate discussion on birds and their calls, and are a great hit with the kids.

- Bird Banding Demonstrations
 - Bird banding is an important tool used in the scientific study and monitoring of wild birds. Uniquely numbered metal bands placed on the foot of birds allow tracking of individual birds throughout their lifetime.
 - Many bird banders are willing to demonstrate banding to a public audience. Find a bird banding station or observatory near you by visiting the [Canadian Migration Monitoring Network page](#).
